Focusing on Bible stories such as God tumbling the walls of Jericho in Joshua 6 and Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem with the crowds waving palms and shouting "Hosanna!", the kids learned through songs, crafts, games, and even their snacks that our God is truly mighty and that in Jesus, the victory is won! KNITTING CIRCLE MINISTRY

Imagine this: a woman in the hospital. She has just been diagnosed with heart disease – the leading cause of death in women. She feels frightened, isolated.

Enter another woman who has been there. A heart disease survivor bearing a hand-made red scarf and a small beautiful bag covered in hearts and filled with information about managing heart disease. Someone to listen and to care.

That is the idea behind HeartScarves. Since it was founded by two women heart disease survivors in 2005, thousands of HeartScarves have found their way to thousands of women heart patients thanks to WomenHeart and its national volunteer corps of WomenHeart Champions.

Distributed in hospitals and at WomenHeart Support Network meetings throughout the country, each hand-made red scarf offers comfort, support and encouragement for a woman with heart disease, and becomes part of her healing journey.

For its Spring/Summer project, the members of St. John's Prayer Shawl Knitting/Crochet Circle chose to share their talents in a way that makes a real difference in the lives of women living with heart disease by knitting and crocheting red scarves. To date, our group has knitted or crocheted 23 scarves in various patterns which will be sent to the WomenHeart's distribution center in Gold Hill, North Carolina. Once at the distribution center, the HeartScarves will be sanitized, packaged and distributed to a WomenHeart Champion who will bring it to a newly diagnosed woman heart patient at her hospital.

God's work, our hands -- giving hope and comfort to women living with heart disease.

Please join us next month as we start our Fall project knitting and crocheting hats and scarves for Seafarers International's Christmas drive. We meet the first Tuesday of every month at 7:30 p.m. in the knotty pine room. No need to know how to knit or crochet. We can teach you!










Gold standard:

Lynbrook resident wins lacrosse national championship


A Lynbrook resident and her IGLOO 2023 lacrosse team won the gold medal at the U.S. Lacrosse national championship in the 12 and under division in Richmond, Va. last month.

Emilia "Mimi" Berkowitz, 12, who is an honor role student at Lynbrook South Middle School and is going into seventh grade, had a strong tournament. U.S. Lacrosse serves as the biggest stage for youth lacrosse, with over 450,000 members nationwide and more than 68 chapters in 45 states. The tournament was likened to the Super Bowl of youth lacrosse.

"It was really amazing," Mimi said. "I felt really accomplished. ... Not only did I learn so much from that whole tournament, but my team just definitely learned more about working together."

Mimi notched four assists and six points against the reigning champion Long Island Yellow Jackets in the semifinals. She picked up a helper on the game's opening goal and scored the second and third tallies of the contest en route to a 9-4 victory. She was strong on both sides of the ball, winning ground ball battles and wreaking havoc on defense by causing turnovers. She also recorded an assist on the gamewinning goal.

During the championship game against NXT 2023, a team from Pennsylvania, Mimi received a penalty shot after being fouled. Rather than shoot the ball, she elected to pass it to her teammate, who scored, earning Mimi an assist. She also was instrumental in helping to clear the ball throughout the game, and captured many ground balls. Her team overcame a 3-0 first-half defi-

cit and went on to win, 7-3.

With the gold medal secured, the IGLOO 2023 team earned an automatic bid into next year's 13 and under national championship, where they will defend their crown. The 2018 tournament is scheduled to take place from Aug. 2 through 5 in Delaware.

To celebrate the championship, the team gathered at one player's house for a pool party, Mimi said. "This team is probably the best lacrosse experience I've ever had," she added.
