HMessage from Pastor Chang:

A New Year -- with Warm Narrative, Sounds, and Fun?!

How grateful we are to have new beginnings, and new calendars to fill up with our plans! What's on *your* mind that you really want to do for the Lord with your precious 52 weeks, 365 days that are coming up?

Some of us might revisit our past to set new goals, start filling in the blank calendar boxes, or make a fresh new year's "to do" list. I also have wishes for 2016, and am pondering how to make them come true. I've got online studies, work and mission plans -- especially as I seek to use my experience as a pastor and chaplain for intergenerational outreach, and attract more people to come to church and join the faith. And then, a holiday concert inspired me...

Last week at Trinity Wall Street, I was pleased to attend a free concert by the "Canadian Brass." Seated close to the aisle in the middle section near the front, I had a good view of the band's procession to the tune "Ding Dong Merrily on High." What an uplifting feeling it brought, that Christmas was here! After their rendition of Johann Sebastian Bach's "Little Fugue," they suddenly brought us back to contemporary 20th century, with "Charlie Brown Christmas." From "Oh Tannenbaum," to "What Child Is This," to "Christmastime is Here," to the Beatles' "Penny Lane"...we all clapped again and again, excited by the diversity and virtuosity of their music.

Imagine mixing J.S. Bach, jazz, and even the old English tune "I Saw Three Ships on Christmas Day"! I only knew this last song from a book of rhymes for children. The vast variety of music attracted New Yorkers from throughout the city and beyond, even on a cloudy, rainy day. As a lady next to me said, "I came all the way from Westchester, NY for this concert, and it was worth it!"

The Canadian team was playful with their instruments, and made the music come alive with warm touches of narrative, sounds, and fun. They used teaching moments between the songs to stimulate people to laughter and enjoyment. They made me relax, yet held my attention fully as they told their musical stories. They wore white shirts, black pants, red ties -- and white sneakers! So even the way they dressed showed their unique group personality.

My friend Lily and I talked afterward about how wonderful it was to see a church filled with people smiling and so happy to be there. No one had to beg them to come. How could we combine the old and the new, the traditional with the modern in such a way that people would flock to come into our church? What could we learn from the Canadian Brass concert for our ministry? We don't know all the answers...but if you're willing to try, let's get up to pray, and move, to act together and use the 52 weeks ahead of us. Let's be good stewards for the coming 365 days!

Lord, have mercy. Grant us your grace and mercy, Amen!

INCARNATION NEWS...

INCARNATION LUTHERAN CHURCH HISTORY

1937-1997

Lutheran Church of the Incarnation got its start from the work of Rev. Svlvanus Schillinger from the Missions Committee of the American Lutheran Church. The congregation was organized throughout the summer and fall of 1937, and officially became "Lutheran Church of the Incarnation" on November 21st-of that year. There were 51charter members.

During its first 10 years, it met in various buildings such as the Lawrence-Cedarhurst Fire Hall and the basement of the Episcopal Chapel at Williams Street and Mulry Lane in Lawrence. The church continued to expand its ministry by beginning a Ladies' Aid Group, Luther League for Youth, a Sunday School, a choir and a men's group. Eventually money was raised to purchase a lot on the corner of Bayview and West Broadway in Cedarhurst. In 1944 Pastor Schillinger accepted a call in North Carolina and Rev. Harry Karger, who also served in Long Beach, became pastor at Incarnation Lutheran. Membership grew and a campaign for building funds began. Rev. Karger left in 1946 and Rev. Burns was called, under whom the present church building was dedicated on January 30, 1949. Other pastors who have served at Incarnation include Rev. Herbert Brokering, Rev. CJ. Kettler, Rev. Edward Baltzersen, Rev. Stephen Kummernuss, Rev. William Terjersen and Rev. Mark Singh-Hueter. Rev. E. Aurand came and stayed until 2006. Rev. Mary Chang came in 2008 and continues to serve our congregation today.

In 1984 the food drive was initiated by Alice Batchelor, Sunday School superintendent. The ministry continues today and has amassed over 20 tons of food! The church supports the work of the Metropolitan New York Synod and the Evangelical Lutheran Church of America.

The members of Incarnation look forward to continuing our mission by joining with our brothers and sisters in Christ at St. John's Evangelical Lutheran Church of Lynbrook.

The Giving Tree: Thank you for your generosity!

Once again, I would like to thank all of you for supporting the Giving Tree Project by donating gifts (as well as wrapping supplies such as boxes, tissue paper and scotch tape) and continuing to make this a success year after year.

The Giving Tree is a project that was begun by the Youth Group in 2009. It is tied to the Christmas gift-giving program at the New Life Center in Hempstead, who gather names of local families in need during the holiday season. St. John's has supported this program for many years, and years ago members of WELCA – and later the Youth Group – would shop for the gifts for several people or one "adopted" family. It was something we all felt so good about, and one year we decided to try something different: we could not only help more families in need, but allow more people to experience the true magic of Christmas by opening it up to everyone in the congregation. And so, the Giving Tree was born at St. John's.

Our little Christmas tree typically holds the holiday wishes of about 15 "adopted" people – children, teens or seniors – who generally ask for simple items such as a shirt, shoes, pajamas or sometimes a toy for a young child. Those 15 people make up about 4 or 5 different families, all who live on Long Island in neighboring towns. New Life requests that each person receive two gifts, but our goal has always been three gifts per person, with at least one of those gifts (even if it's not requested) to be a toy or a fun item for each child or teen. In addition – because our congregation has proven to be so generous and all the gift tags are almost gone the first week the tree is up – we also have given three "family" gifts which include candy, cookies and a gift card to a grocery store, to be enjoyed by the whole family.

This Christmas, we increased the giving by adding more tags and more gifts – and still, every tag was taken and fulfilled. We provided 90 gifts for 17 people of 7 different families.

Your generous donations this year and every year go a long way to give wonderful Christmas memories for these families, and a big thank you to all of you for participating in this program and recognizing that the true joy of the season is to give to others. God Bless you all!
