AND SOMETHING TO THINK ABOUT:

10 WAYS TO WELCOME YOUR NEW PASTOR

- 1. Open your hearts and decide that you are going to love your new pastor. Begin praying daily for the new pastor.
- 2. Send cards of welcome and encouragement to the incoming pastor.
- 3. Know that welcoming your new pastor in genuine and effective ways lays the ground work for a healthy and vital relationship and the development of stable, long-term ministries together.
- 4. Plan for his transition. Offer to help. Occasionally important welcoming gestures are missed with everyone thinking that someone else is handling these details.
- 5. Volunteer to help make sure the parsonage and pastor's office are clean and ready. Offer to help prepare his home and his office for arrival.
- 6. Offer to have someone cut the grass, plant flowers or decorate with potted plants. Join the Lawn Rangers!
- 7. Offer to stock the parsonage refrigerator and pantry with some staples.
- 8. Come to greet the new pastor when he arrives and to help as needed. And come to his first worship and stay introduce yourself and to welcome him.
- 9. Offer to provide meals the first few days, the first few weeks. Call or email ahead of time so that he knows you are coming. If you don't cook, give gift certificates to several of your favorite restaurants in the community.
- 10. Introduce yourself to the pastor repeatedly! You have one name to learn; your pastor has many names to learn.

A Message from Pastor Jeff Laustsen ~

Moore Hall, Virginia Theological Seminary Alexandria, VA Sunday, July 23, 2013

So here I am, sitting at the desk in my dorm room after having finished another book for tomorrow morning's class. We've already had one week of classes that begin at 8:00 a.m.; daily chapel services; case study group discussions; lectures and presentations; and lots of time in the refectory for all sorts of discussions. My time here in Virginia has been engaging, stimulating, and very exhausting!

If there have been any surprises during this three-week session, it was my discovery that among the entire student body, I'm the only Lutheran! I knew that enrolling in an Episcopal seminary meant that I would be in a denominational minority, but I through there would be at least a few fellow Lutherans; after all, the ELCA is a full-communion partner with the Episcopal Church. There are two Lutherans on the faculty, but among my fellow students I'm the only one with a working knowledge of the ELW and the *Small Catechism*.

Being the sole Lutheran on the VTS campus has led to some interesting experiences. In our Liturgical Theology class, our professor would often look to me to explain the subtle differences in the manner in which Lutherans understand our worship service and the role of the pastor in worship leadership. When the local synod was having a reelection of their bishops, several of my Episcopal colleagues were confused, since their bishops are elected for life. This past Friday, I was invited to preside at Holy Communion at the VTS chapel using our Lutheran order of worship – again, simply due to the fact that I was the *only* ordained Lutheran pastor on campus that day!

Being in this position has challenged me to work on what some people call my Lutheran "elevator speech," a few words that sum up the essentials of our Lutheran faith as if we had to explain it during a typical ride on an elevator. What's essential about our Lutheran understanding of the Christian faith? What does it mean to be a Lutheran Christian? How do Lutherans understand God, each other, and the world? Why does Lutheranism still matter?

There are many hallmarks of our Lutheran tradition to which we could point: justification by grace through faith; grace alone, faith alone, the Word alone; the priesthood of all believers; and the manner in which we worship and serve in the name of Christ. But above all, being a Lutheran means that we believe that there is a place for everyone in the church of Jesus Christ. God welcomes all people into our fellowship, and God empowers each one of us to use our gifts to glorify God and serve one another. Every person – pastors, deacons, teachers, council members, and everyone who worships and serves – has an important place in our church. As our Lutheran confession of faith, the *Augsburg Confession*, states, the church is the "assembly of all believers among whom the Gospel is purely preached and the sacraments are administered according to the Gospel." Lutherans are a people who are radically centered on the gospel call to welcome all people in Christ's name as we "declare the mighty acts of him who called you out of darkness into his marvelous light." (1 Peter 2:9).

So off to bed I go (my dorm bed isn't bad, but it sure isn't as comfortable as the one we have at home!). Monday morning means it's time for an early class, a full afternoon of case studies, an evening presentation on our doctoral thesis, and lots of good conversation and fellowship. I'm sure that at some point, my "Lutheranness" will come up – always in a positive sense, as my fellow students seek a better understanding of what it means for me to be a Lutheran. Perhaps it will happen to you this week – at work, in your neighborhood, or among friends, someone will ask you what it means for you to be a Lutheran. Just remember: Lutherans are a people who have been called, gathered, empowered, and sent by God to make a difference in the name of Jesus Christ.

I'll be back soon, and we can continue to explore what it means for us to be a Lutheran Church called together in this place!

And....do not forget our new Scarecrow building table.

BUILD A SCARECROW

We are going to have the inaugural Build-a Scarecrow table at this years' Harvest Festival. Any one who comes to the table will have the opportunity to create their own custom made scarecrow (for a modest fee...~\$10- \$15 depending on material costs) to help bring in the fall season.

To make this possible, were looking for donations of the following items to use for the scarecrow creations:

- ▲ Long sleeve shirts (Flannels preferably for the authentic scarecrow look, adult or children sizes)
- ▶ Pants...denim or carpenter pants or whatever you can spare. (again, adult or children sizes)
- Any wood or lumber that could be used to make the armatures for the scarecrows. Just need something in the shape of a cross to put in the sleeves and provide support for when the scarecrows are mounted in the ground.

The plan is to stuff the clothes with newspapers and hay, attach a head to the scarecrow, then attach it to an armature so the scarecrow can be planted" in your yard.

If you do have any of these items that you would be willing to donate, or if you come across any of these items at a garage sale, thrift store etc, please set them aside and contact me so I can get an idea of how many scarecrows well be able to accommodate. I'll be placing a bin in the Narthex for any donations. Here's to hoping that this will be a success!
