A MESSAGE FROM PASTOR ALEX...

I was up in our church steeple recently to change one of the lightbulbs on our cross that had burned out when an old song from my childhood suddenly came to mind:

The church is not a building,
the church is not a steeple,
the church is not a resting place,
the church is a people!

I am the church!
You are the church!
We are the church together!
All who follow Jesus,
all around the world!
Yes, we're the church together!



Yes, my friends, **we are the church together, even when we're apart!** I have missed you all so much during this long and unprecedented pandemic (it's been over 60 days now since we last gathered at SJILC), and even though I have been in our church building almost every day and have been able to lead worship from our sanctuary, it still hasn't felt like church. Not even "remotely" close!

Don't get me wrong, I'm very thankful for these amazing video conferencing platforms like WebEx and Zoom which have helped us stay connected over the past two months. Being able to hold live worship services and meetings where we can see each other, converse, and offer mutual support has been a wonderful blessing for us, to be sure. But it's still not the same. When I look out at the empty pews each week and imagine all of you sitting there, I'm reminded of what that old Sunday School song taught me: the church is not a building, but a **people**.

1 Peter 2:5 tells us that we are like living stones who are being "built into a spiritual house, to be a holy priesthood, to offer spiritual sacrifices acceptable to God through Jesus Christ." Granted, we don't tend to think of stones as being alive or living, and obviously the author of 1 Peter is referring to a spiritual house here rather than a physical one! However, as we approach the end of this Easter season and look forward to Ascension and Pentecost, I cannot help but think of another stone – the one that was rolled away on that first Easter morning. Because of Christ, our chief cornerstone, and the good news of the resurrection, we are not only given the promised hope of new life in Him, but we are also joined to him and to one another through the waters of our baptism.

So as we continue to wait out this virus and look forward to that day when we can come together once again as a church, may we remember the unity we share in the love of our risen Lord, Jesus Christ. Trusting in this good news, we can live without worry or fear, so that, in the words of 1 Peter, "we may proclaim the mighty acts of Him who has called us out of darkness into his marvelous light."



Food for Thought...

Ascension Day this year is Thursday, May 21, which will be the 40th day of this Easter season. We also just finished Lent, a season that lasted 40 days (not counting the Sundays).

The Latin root of the word "quarantine" is "forty".

So what does the Bible say about 40?

The flood lasted 40 days.

40 years Moses fled Egypt.

40 days Moses stayed on Mount Sinai to receive the Commandments.
