## **PASTOR'S REFLECTIONS ~**

"Is it that time of year again?" I thought the other day as I turned on the radio. I frequently listen to a public radio station, and as I tuned in that morning, I heard the familiar, unmistakable sound of the tri-annual pledge drive. There they were again, asking for my money.

Andy & I are sustaining members; we have money automatically withdrawn from our checking account each month to help support the station. I listen even when it is pledge drive time, despite the regular requests for money from those who have yet to make a pledge. Still, though, I sometimes wish that there was a special code or button I could push as an already-contributing member to just bypass the drive so I wouldn't have to hear their pleas for money.

Perhaps you feel the same way every fall when the church enters into its annual financial stewardship program. "This again?" Maybe you make a pledge and give faithfully every year and wish you could just skip having to hear about it again. Or maybe you don't pledge (or can't give as much as you think you should be giving), and would rather not be reminded or asked again, year after year.

I can understand either of those feelings. Yet churches continue to do annual giving programs every year because it is easy for us to lose sight of why we give, and important that we take time regularly to reflect on God's giving and our response. We seem to have a natural tendency to look around us and notice what we don't have, to pay attention to the things that seem to be lacking, rather than recognizing the abundance God has poured out on us. Even when we feel most financially strapped, most of us have more than enough; most of us have enough that we have enough to share.

The annual stewardship program is one way that we as a church seek to remind all of us of how God provides what we need. It's an invitation for us to seek God's face and prayerfully think and talk about how we might give back to God and God's work in response. It's a challenge (sometimes a hard challenge!) for us to put our trust in God, especially when we don't know what our futures will hold. It's often even more difficult to put that trust into action by making a commitment to give to and through God's church at St. John's. Yet when we do that, when we make a commitment to give, and even to grow in our giving over time, it's amazing what happens. We tend to pay closer attention to how God continues to provide and our faith and trust grow deeper as a result! The church benefits from your giving, of course – it's everyone's offerings that allow us to provide worship and Christian Education and outreach and all of the other ministries that take place within our walls and in our communities – but the giver benefits too, from the increased faith, gratitude, and joy that come along with giving.

With that in mind, I offer a few practical suggestions as you think about what God is calling you to give in the coming year. First, look at your income (weekly, monthly, or annually), and see what percentage you are currently giving. Then determine to grow in your giving. A good model to follow is **the 10-10-80 plan**: 10% to the church, 10% to savings, and 80% to do God's work through your daily living (housing, transportation, clothing, etc.). If you're not anywhere near 10%, you're not alone. But why not try to grow 1% in your giving each year, until you are at or beyond 10%? I've never met a tither (someone who gives 10% of their income away) who has regretted it. (Andy & I tithe, and we rejoice in doing it!) Next, set aside that money 1<sup>st</sup> thing when you get paid. I write out my offering checks at the beginning of the month, so I know that I won't "accidentally" spend that money on something else. Finally, know that as your income changes, your giving should adjust as well. If you get a raise, increase your giving. If you take a pay cut, your offering can be decreased. And if you fall on desperate financial times, know that the church will understand, and will try to help as we can.

Imagine what our church could do for God's mission in the world if all of us gave 10% of our income to what God longs to do in us and in our communities! Our budget concerns of how we will meet our expenses would immediately be transformed into concerns of what to do with all of the resources God has placed at our disposal through you! It's a great joy at every October Council meeting as we sit around the table trying to determine how to give our Harvest Festival proceeds away!

1911: The D. W. Griffith SILENT movie "The Stuff Heroes are Made Of" was shot in Lynbrook.

The first Church Council meeting was held in 1912 with 7 members.

1928: The first talking movie "The Patriot" was filmed in Lynbrook. Can anyone recall who starred in the movie? It definitely was not Mel Gibson.

One Sunday it was so hot, some choir members passed out. Does anyone remember that?

Pastor Emeritus Robert H. Arnold was a son of St. Johns congregation. He was baptized, confirmed, and married in this Church. *The Grapevine (The Messenger's* predecessor) tells of a wedding presided at by Pastor Arnold. It consisted of 1 or 2 policemen, but the Groom failed to show up!
