PASTOR'S REFLECTIONS~

A friend of mine recently announced on Facebook that she is canceling Christmas.

"Canceling Christmas?" I asked. "What's *that* about?"

She responded that she had been with a group of mothers one day, and the subject of Christmas had come up. Spontaneously she said, "I'm canceling Christmas this year!" and all of the other mothers cheered. As a group, they decided that big celebrations of Christmas and individual birthdays should rotate, every other year, because trying to do it all and do it the way everyone seems to expect it "should" be done just gets too stressful. Why participate in something that brings primarily, not joy, but anxiety and aggravation?

I think she's hit on something when it comes to the stress that surrounds the holidays. Every year at this time, I begin to see articles written about how to simplify the holidays, how to reconnect with the meaning of the season, how to find the joy of Christmas again. And every year, I hear from friends and family and church members about how much they still have to do, how they're nowhere near "ready" for Christmas to come. I see the pressure on their faces. I hear it in their voices. I feel it too. Even when we *try* to simplify the way we celebrate the holidays, we feel the influence of our culture, urging us to make it bigger, better, brighter. We're like Clark Griswold in my husband's favorite Christmas movie, *Christmas Vacation*. All he wants is to have an old-fashioned family Christmas, one that matches the image in his mind's eye. Clark makes it his mission to have the "perfect" Christmas, so he drags his family miles through the snow drifts to find the biggest Christmas tree in existence. He spends hours creating the most elaborate Christmas display in the neighborhood (and then can't figure out how to get the lights to come on and stay on!). He plans to give his family the most wonderful Christmas present

they've ever received (a swimming pool, to be paid for out of his anticipated Christmas bonus).

Of course, none of these things works out the way he hopes and plans, and hilarity ensues (for the movie watcher anyway). As Clark typically does, he nearly drives himself crazy with all of his efforts, but in the end, it turns out the only person who cares about those things is Clark. His family would be happy and content just to be together – and not see him getting so obsessed about every single detail.

So, how about you? Do your holiday preparations help you and your loved ones to enter into a spirit of joy and thanksgiving? Do they cultivate an attitude of anticipation for the coming of God's greatest gift, Jesus? Do they draw us closer together, or do we find ourselves lashing out at each other over small details because of the pressure to have the "perfect" Christmas?

What if we said, "Enough!"? What if we decided that this year we would reclaim the true meaning of Christmas? I'm not saying we should outright cancel Christmas – but what if we focused less on the presents and the decorations, and took Christmas back to the basics? Worship. Time together. Gifts given that reflect our values and show concern for those who make them (see the "Alternative Christmas Gift Ideas" article elsewhere in this newsletter for ideas). Talk with your loved ones about what they most remember and enjoyed from Christmases past. You might be surprised at what matters most – and you might find yourself better able to truly rejoice come Christmas, recognizing that the best gift of all isn't flashy or expensive or over-the-top, but comes to us in a humble stable, in quiet stillness, in the shining of a star.



OFFERING UPDATE

Here is an update on how the weekly offerings are tracking through October 2011:

Offering/General Income YTD	\$81,395
<u>General Expenses YTD</u>	<u>\$88,156</u>
Running Deficit for 2011	\$ 6,761

Thankfully, offerings have been generous. However, as of October 31st, there was a \$6,761 deficit between our offerings and general expenses. As a result, it will be necessary to utilize savings to cover our costs for property insurance.

If you are able, St. Johns would appreciate your help to reduce the shortfall.

Last year, the St John's Fund was established as a means towards maintaining a balanced budget. Would you please consider an additional offering to the St. John's Fund this year? A special envelope is enclosed with this month's Messenger and is also available at each service from your usher.

1912 - 2012 MEMORABLE MOMENTS

In 1993 Walter Bonn was listed on the Nassau County Senior Citizen Honor Roll for recognition of his volunteer service as a English as a 2nd Language (ESL) Teacher for newly arrived students that spoke little or no English.

Walter was the longest Sunday School Superintendent of St. John's and for 64 years the longest Charter Member of St. John's.

The death of Emeritus Robert H. Arnold also marked the end of an era. Pastor Arnold was a son of this congregation, baptized, confirmed and married in this Church.


